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CULTURE & LANGUAGE

Home to over 7000 islands, the Philippines is one of those destinations that is largely underrated. The ones that go will be rewarded with endless white sandy beaches, crystal clear waters and a vibrant marine life. Besides, there are also gleaming emerald-colored volcanoes, impressive rice fields and mesmerizing mountains.







Despite being home to multiple dialects, Tagalog is considered as the National language. The language was renamed "Pilipino" in 1959 and finally "Filipino" in 1973. However, one of the most beautiful things about the Philippines is that almost everyone speaks English, which makes it easy to communicate with the locals.



LANGUAGE

The Philippines is a country that has varied cultural influences. Most of these influences are results of previous colonization, deriving mainly from the culture of Spain and the United States. Despite all of these influences, the old Asian culture of Filipinos has been retained and are clearly seen in their way of life, beliefs and customs.

FESTIVALS

There are a number of holidays, long weekends and top festivals in the Philippines that happen throughout the year. These vibrant festivals are characterized by the history, artistry, creativity, and passion of the people. While some of them take place for just a day, a lot of them are celebrating for a week and even for an entire month.









PAHIYAS FESTIVAL

During the month of May, Lucban showcases a unique harvest festival also known as the Pahiyas Festival. Locals decorate their homes in lively and vibrant colors. Farm produce like handicrafts, fruits, vegetables, and kiping (rice wafers) are hanging around the houses as decorations.

ATI-ATIHAN FESTIVAL


The Ati-Atihan Festival is one of the oldest and biggest festivals in the Philippines. This mardi gras lasts for a whole week, with activities set from sunrise to sunset. The highlights are the tribal dances, the booming drum beats, the loud chants, and the Catholic rituals, which will surely make any visitor dance their heart out.

PANAGBENGA FESTIVAL

This festival highlights the bountiful blooming of the flowers and to pay tribute to the rising up of the city from the 1990 Luzon earthquake. During the festival, expect beautiful parades of floats made from different flowers, parading throughout the city, followed by children and adults adorned as flora and fauna.

CUISINE

Filipino cuisine is composed of the cuisines of more than a hundred distinct ethno-linguistic groups found throughout the Philippine archipelago.





ADOBO

This Filipino dish is made by stewing meat (usually chicken, pork, or a combination of both) in soy sauce and vinegar, adding peppercorns and bay leaves for that special flavour.



KARE-KARE

This rich stew is made with peanut sauce and, customarily, oxtail, but other meatier cuts of beef can also be added in. Many Filipinos will consider karekare incomplete without a serving of bagoong (fermented seafood paste) on the side.



LECHON

One of the top contenders among the best Filipino dishes is perhaps the famous lechon. After all, it is hard to top a tasty, fully-roasted pig with perfectly crisp skin and juicy meat. This is a must at any grand Pinoy gathering or fiesta.



KINILAW


The Filipino version of ceviche is light, delicious and is served with many different variations to it.

BEST TIME


The best time o visit the philippines is from December to February when temperatures are around 24°C-31°C. A;though the dry season lasts from November to April, temperatures are high during March and April, with highs of 34°C.

Outside of this period, humidity increases and the rains come, assisting Cambodian farmers in the growing of their crops.










MANILA

VISA

Nationals from 151 countries who are traveling to the Philippines for business and tourism purposes are allowed to enter the Philippines without visas for a stay not exceeding thirty (30) days, provided they hold valid tickets for their return journey to port of origin or next port of destination and their passports valid for a period of at least six (6) months beyond the contemplated period of stay.



TRAVEL TIPS

- The Philippines has four distinct climate zones. Study the regional forecasts carefully, research when to go and choose your destination accordingly
- Stay flexible, not everything will go as planned and that's okay. Sometimes even for the better
- Try Karaoke and don't worry about how you sound. Nobody will judge you and you shouldn't either.
- Living in the Philippines is cheap. So, don't get frustrated and make a scene over a dollar more during rush hour. It will make everyone uncomfortable.
- It's considered impolite to arrive on time in the Philippines. About 15 minutes late is the socially acceptable arrival time.
